Welcoming the Stranger

F ereyba met with SVdP caseworkers, recalling her former days as an oral surgeon in Afghanistan; before the emergency Visa, before running to a helicopter for safety, before evacuating to the U.S. through Refugee and Immigration Services with Catholic Charities. Being targeted because her father was a General in the Afghan army.

Fereyba arrived with her husband and young daughter; bearing a child in her womb to be born in a foreign land. They arrived with the clothes on their backs and a bag of belongings. They started in a refugee camp in NJ and relocated to NC where their son was born in a high-risk pregnancy. They came to Fairfax, VA to be closer to a brother, who helped them with a car. Fereyba was quick to learn English and obtain a driver's license. She is studying for a dental exam to practice dentistry. Her husband works as a dental hygienist to pay rent on their small apartment.

With the help of SVdP and friends, they are current with rent

and have received clothing, diapers and gift cards for basic needs. SVdP makes home visits and advocates for other eligible resources.

Jovil and his family came from Haiti and reside in a basement apartment. This Christian family depends on the SVdP food pantry each month for food, diapers and hygiene products. Jovil had once started a school for needy children in Haiti with a master's degree in education. His wife was a registered nurse. Since their degrees do not transfer in the U.S., they take lower paying jobs. His wife is a certified nursing assistant (CNA) and will work after they find affordable child care.

The biggest challenges facing these families are: affordable housing, an adequate income, food, child care and baby products. Gift cards are provided as needed. The SVdP home visit provides hope and stability to overcome many obstacles. SVdP mediates God's grace in the midst of uncertainty and loneliness.



SVdP Twins with St. Michael Parish in Arizona

P art of our work includes lending a helping hand to other SVdP conferences in lower income areas. St. Michael's Conference in Gila Bend, AZ is one that we assist or twin with. Their Conference has 9 members who serve a 100-mile radius. Located next to the St. Lucy Indian Reservation, they primarily serve its residents, many of whom struggle with addictions. St. Michaels provides water, snacks and a hose around back to shower off. They cover some rent and utility expenses for families, as well as clothes and extra food through their food pantry which serves about 90 families a month. There is no other means of support in their area and the nearest Walmart is 40 miles away.



Pantry Day: A Joyful Mission

The SVdP food pantry opens its doors on every 3rd Saturday to feed the hungry. Pantry day is a beehive of activity for volunteers. There are traffic monitors, greeters, baggers, stockers, cart runners and car loaders. No job is too small and each one joyfully accomplished.

In the 1990's, a couple of registered nurses operated a small outreach ministry to provide groceries to parishioners. A nurse still volunteers with SVdP today, providing food and essentials to about 143 families. Many longstanding volunteers are 'regulars' on pantry day and their generous spirit fuels the camaraderie of this joyful mission.

The pantry has operated on a drive-thru basis since Covid. The system runs efficiently yet pauses for meaningful interactions with visitors. As pantry visitors loop around the parking lot they are greeted with smiles and encouraging words. Their cars are loaded up with non-perishable food, fresh fruits and vegetables (courtesy of the Knights of Columbus), bread, cereal, baby products and household and hygiene items.

Diapers and formula are always in great demand. We accept diaper donations in all sizes, in the wooden box at the back of the church. The acquisition of baby formula has its own story. During a card game, a parishioner learned that the postal service was disposing of large quantities of canned formula samples. An industrious husband and wife team devised a plan to rescue the formula from the Lorton postal distribution center to sort and distribute on pantry day. Another dedicated pantry couple promptly delivers any left-over cans to the Fredericksburg Food Bank. Newly expired cans feed puppies at local animal shelters.
