Have you ever heard the term Vincentian? A food pantry or thrift store helper may come to mind, yet I am a Vincentian, and neither of those.

The root word Vincent comes from the well-known 17th-century French saint, St. Vincent de Paul. The Society of St. Vincent de Paul was founded in Paris in 1833, and named after this patron saint of charitable societies. Its members are called Vincentians. Today, the Society spans over 150 countries and the Arlington Diocese has eleven active conferences that model spirituality, friendship, and service.


My Vincentian journey over the last few decades is a testament to its transformative power. I've witnessed how God can place a humble Vincentian in an ordinary situation and empower them to impact their neighbor's lives in deeply fulfilling ways.

As a Vincentian, I've accomplished things through God's grace that I never imagined. I met a woman in a nursing home and took her to a prison to visit her son who she hadn't seen in twelve years. I helped a young family relocate after they learned that their son had a brain tumor. I've comforted dozens of senior fire victims who lost everything in a fire and helped them resettle. I supported a homeless woman's journey to bury her mother's ashes.

God's love and compassion for the poor are at the heart of the Vincentian mission. Vincentians are called to: Be the face of Christ! See the face of Christ! The five key Vincentian virtues are simplicity, humility, gentleness, selflessness, and zeal.

When William Shakespeare coined the expression, "The world is my oyster," he wasn't referring to Vincentians, and yet, the world is my oyster when I can bring joy to wherever God calls me.






## Warm Coats and Compassion

The Knights of Columbus at St. Clare's Parish in Clifton came through again! Their donation of seventy brand-new children's coats went a long way to helping families in need. Diane Michalke, a Vincentian, managed the tracking and delivery of the coats, ensuring local families could keep their children warm during winter.

Forty-four coats were given to children from families we had served throughout the year. Some coats were accompanied by Christmas gifts from Blue Envelope Sponsors, who furnished children's toys, books, learning games, candy, and clothing. The Blue Envelope Project blessed nine families last year and hopes to have more sponsors in 2025 to expand this important work.

Francisco Solares, one of our newest members, connected us with the Family Liaison at a nearby elementary school, who received eight coats to distribute to students in the reduced lunch program. The remaining eighteen boys' and girls' coats were warmly received at a Fairfax County homeless shelter for women and children. These heartwarming endeavors make a huge impact on our community.

We were pleased to hear that Maria's father is recovering at home. Unfortunately, he returned with numerous medical bills the family could not pay.

Our St. Vincent de Paul chapter or conference enlisted the aid of the Mid-Atlantic Region Financial Assistance Network (MARFAN). MARFAN is a new funding program that helps with extraordinary circumstances and represents about 400 SVdP conferences in seven eastern states: VA, DC, WV, MD, DE, NJ, and PA.

ur neighbor, Sara showed us an electric bill totaling thousands of dollars! She was facing significant challenges with medical issues and a tenant who had stopped paying rent. The situation had spiraled out of control, and Sara could no longer recall the names of organizations she had contacted or even her utility account number!

She was experiencing "tyranny of the moment" when major stress clouds judgment and clear thinking becomes impossible. After assuring her of our support, we helped her organize her thoughts and encouraged her to contact other community partners to bridge the gaps.

The next day Sara was more optimistic. Having circled back and reconnected with various agencies, Sara acquired over a thousand dollars in support, and her utility bill was reduced by half. With her debt paid off, she could smile again and exclaim "God is good!"

He entered the priesthood to acquire a comfortable lifestyle until the confession of a dying man revealed his true charism to serve the poor.


He was kidnapped on a ship by pirates five years after being ordained and sold as a slave; after converting his master, both escaped.
